LEGAL BASIS FOR THE RES PLANS

THE TREATY

ARTICLE 20 OF THE TREATY

- The Contracting Parties shall provide to the European Commission within one year of the date of entry into force of the Treaty:
 1. a plan to implement **Directive 2001/77/EC** on the promotion of electricity produced from renewable energy sources in the internal electricity market; and
 2. a plan to implement **Directive 2003/30/EC** on the promotion of the use of biofuels or other renewable fuels for transport.
- The European Commission shall present the plan of each Contracting Party to the Ministerial Council for adoption.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE RES PLANS

STEPS

PROCEDURE AND RESULT

- The Secretariat conducted consultations on the approach with the Contracting Parties by December 2006;
- The Secretariat provided assistance to the Contracting Parties in preparation of the plans by March 2007;
- All Contracting Parties provided the plans to the Commission and the Secretariat by April 2007;
- The Commission and the Secretariat consolidated all plans by June 2007;
- The Commission presents the plans of each Contracting Party to the Ministerial Council on 29 June 2007.

REPORT ON THE RES PLANS

OBJECTIVE

EXPLICIT COMPARISON OF THE PLANS

- All Contracting Parties elaborated the plans by using a common template, which enables easier and more explicit comparison of the plans;
- The plans were elaborated, being currently under evaluation by the Commission, the Secretariat and consultants (consultancy services commissioned from the EIHP Zagreb);
- The Interim Report has been produced in late June and the Final Report will be issued in the beginning of August 2007 (3 months in total);
- The objective of the Reports is to address in a single framework specific tasks which should be realised by the Contracting Parties, assess the existing and future barriers and propose means for overcoming;

NEXT STEPS

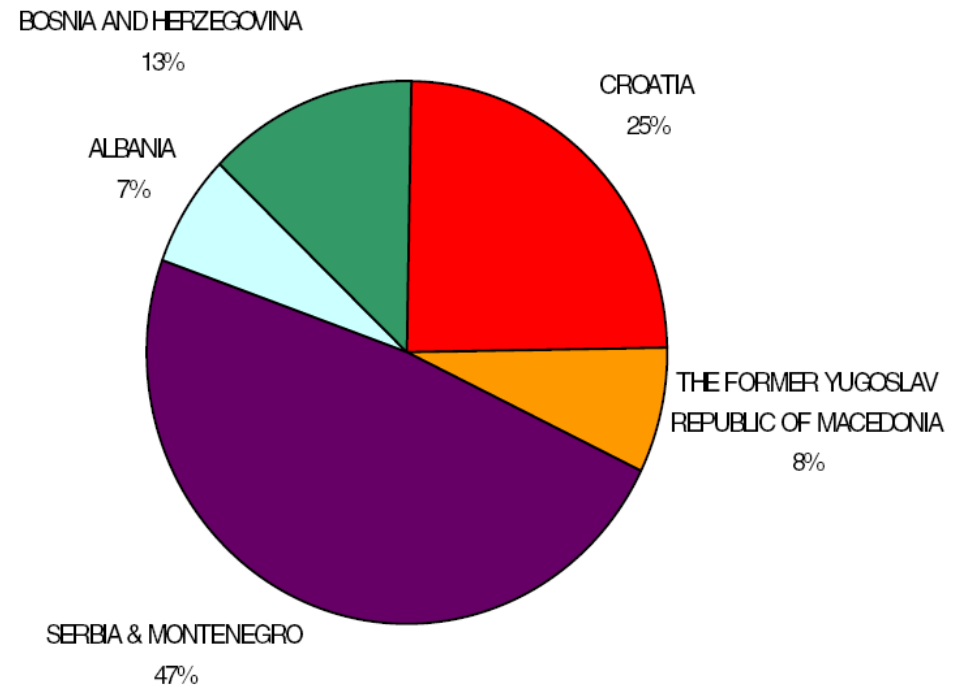
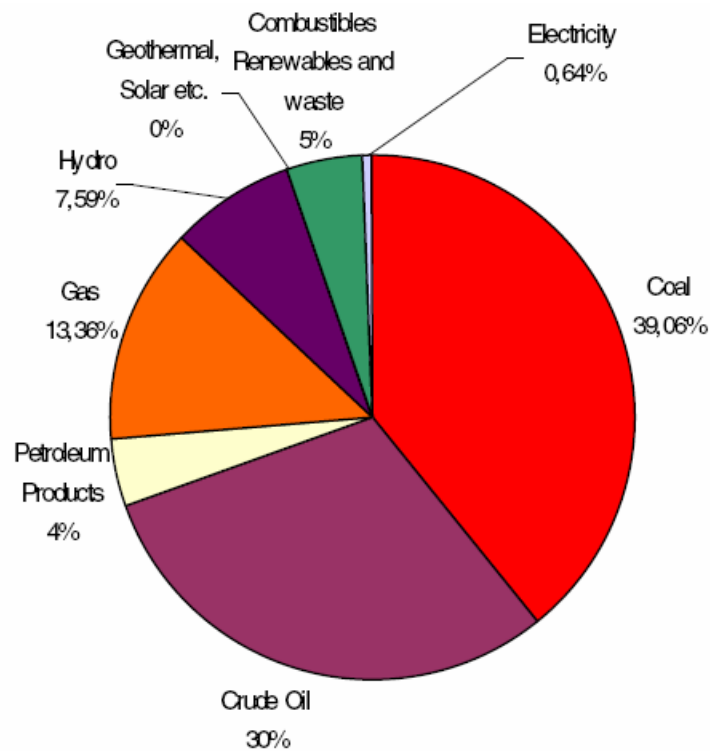
FROM THE INTERIM REPORT TO THE FINAL ONE

- As the first step the information will be collected from the Contracting Parties and national responsible authorities on energy sector data;
- In particular data will be asked on the implementation, completion timeframe, and reference documents/status of the action regarding the implementation of the Directives 2001/77/EC and 2003/30/EC;
- Information will be gathered from implemented and ongoing EC research projects within 6FP and other relevant sources of information;
- Based on the collected information the current situation will be reviewed, and the plans for RES-E and biofuels Directives will be evaluated;
- The Final Report of all findings will be drafted making recommendations for future actions and plans;

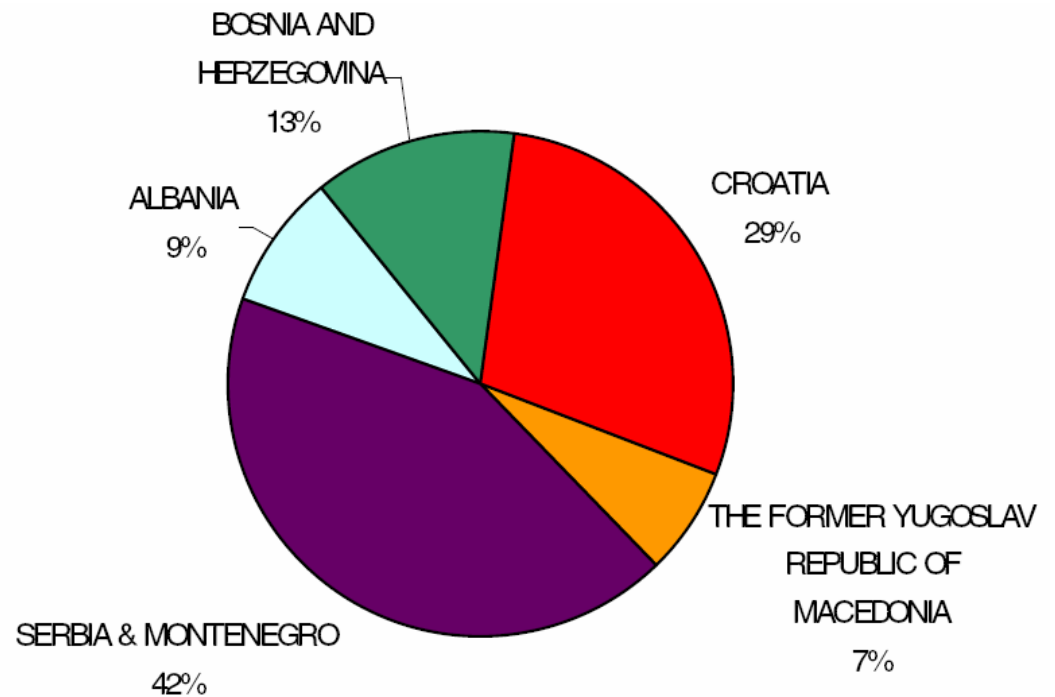
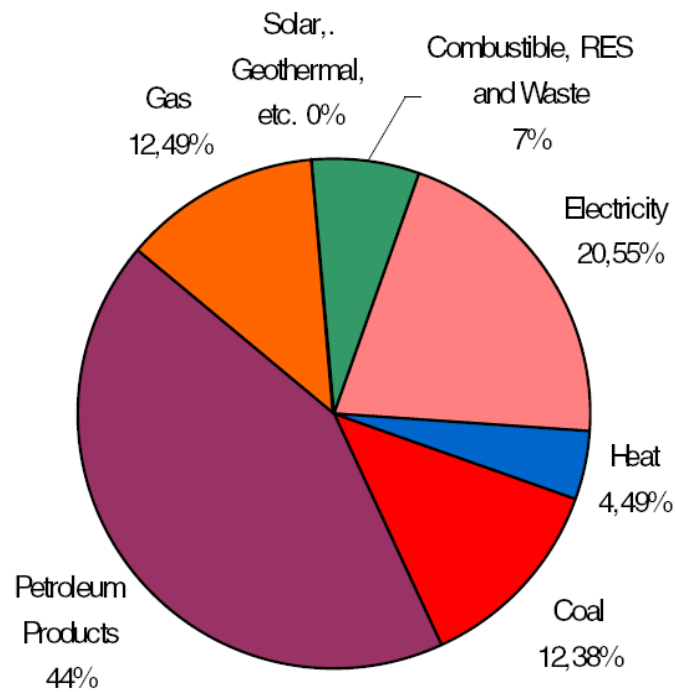
Total primary energy supply in 2004 (per sources)

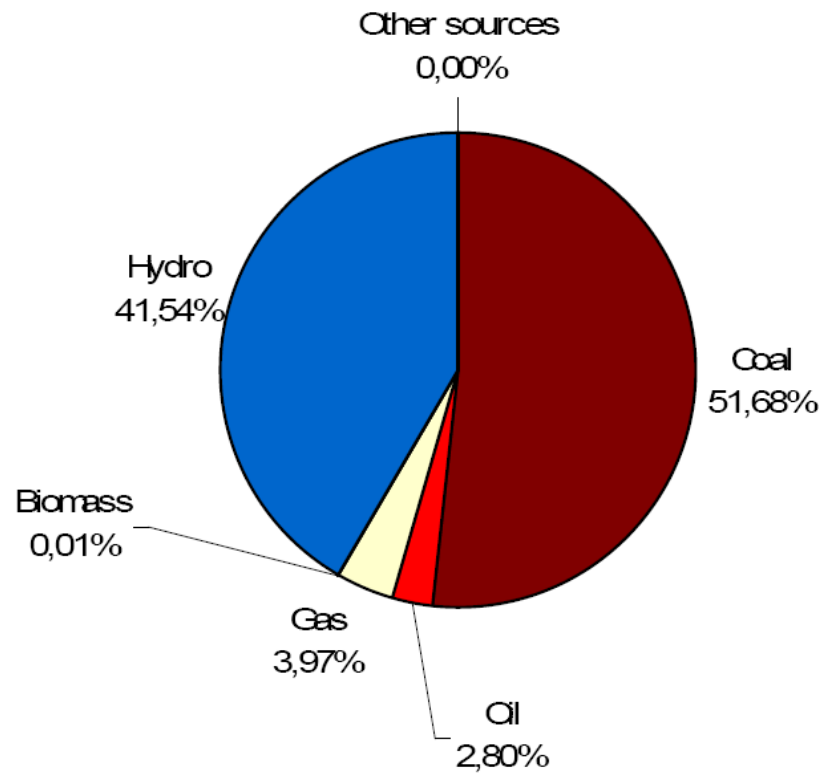
Total final consumption in 2004 (per sources)

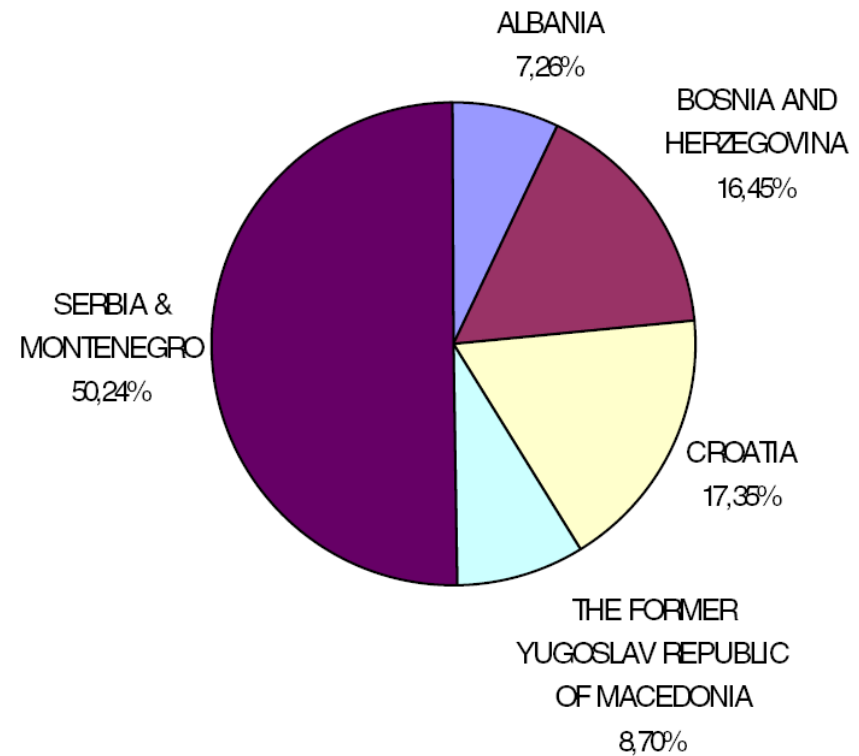

EXPECTATIONS FROM THE REPORT

PRELIMINARY OUTCOME

INFORMATION PROVIDED ON THE FOLLOWING ITEMS

- Hydro: 41.54% (EU-27 target: 21% by 2010)
- But, legislative basis related to RES is not well developed;
- Majority of the Contracting Parties have yet to make firm and binding action plans on implementation of EU Directive 2001/77/EC:
 - o setting indicative targets for production of electricity from RES and for reduction of GHG emissions,
 - o putting support scheme in place for the production of electricity from renewables,
 - o appointing institution to certify the energy source from which the electricity is produced,
 - o applying specific authorisation procedures to RES power plants, and
 - o covering grid connection and system operation issues.
- Even more of further work is needed for the EU Directive 2003/30/EC.
